The exhibits, which are joint projects of the Sami Cultural Center and Báiki, will be opening on the weekend of September 9 and 10, 2016, at the Scandinavian Heritage Foundation's Nordia House in Portland, Oregon.

The Sami Reindeer People of Alaska exhibit tells the stories of the reindeer herders hired by the U.S. government in 1894 and 1898 to teach reindeer husbandry to Native Alaskans while Sámi - Walking With Reindeer features photographs by Erika Larsen of contemporary reindeer herding life. 

February 20 – Traditional Sami Band Weaving Demonstration and Workshop with Laurel Sanders was an introductory session in which Laurel showed examples and demonstrated the steps of choosing a design, measuring warp, threading the heddle, setting up, and weaving colorful bands.

March 19 - Traditional Sami Pouch/Purse Making Workshop

A group of twelve tried our hands at making a Sami pouch. Workshop participants studied examples of Sami purses and pouches and then cut and began work on a traditional style pouch using leather and/or felt. Most participants took their pouches home for finishing touches.

April 23 – 9 a.m. - 4 p.m. - Sami Bracelet Workshop

with Norma Resfal, presented by the Nordic Center of Duluth.

Norma will assist in creating a Sámi-inspired bracelet, using traditional materials—reindeer leather, spun pewter thread, and a button made of shed reindeer antler.

April 24 – 3 - 4:30 p.m. - Sunfunday: Sami Duodji for Kids

by guest instructor Norma Resfal with Alison Aune, presented by the Nordic Center of Duluth. Kids will have fun making take-home crafts based on traditional Sami designs and colors at this Sunfunday and will see and learn about the lavvu at the Sami Center.
